

## Dwight School Alumnus, Race Imboden, Named to USA Olympic Fencing Team

### *Dwight Fosters “Spark of Genius” All the Way to London with Hopes of Gold*

**New York, NY, April 15, 2012:** Today, Race Imboden, 2011 graduate of Dwight School New York, was officially named to the United States Olympic Team by the US Fencing Association. After the fourth World Cup event, he mathematically qualified for the Olympics in Men’s Foil based on his high team rankings. Mr. Imboden is currently #6 in the FIE (Fédération Internationale d’Escrime) World Senior Rankings, #2 in the USA Fencing Division I (Senior), and #2 in the USA Fencing Under 19 Division (Junior).

“I couldn’t be more excited and honored to be competing as a member of Team USA, especially in London because my mother’s home country is England. For nine years, I have been working toward this goal with the amazing support and sacrifice of my parents to whom I’m eternally grateful. I’m also grateful to The Dwight School, which helped me to achieve my dream of competing in the Olympics by allowing me the time and flexibility to train, travel the world, and compete while I was a student,” said Mr. Imboden.

Dwight School New York, located on Manhattan’s Upper West Side, is dedicated to creating world leaders through academic excellence. Dwight offers scholar-athletes like Mr. Imboden the ability to pursue their passion of competing at high levels while still meeting the rigorous demands of the School’s International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum. Mr. Imboden selected Dwight because of its focus on personalized learning, which is one of the School’s three pillars, along with global vision and community service.

The Dwight family will be glued to the screen when Race competes this summer in London,” said Chancellor Stephen Spahn, the longest running head of school in New York City.

Mr. Imboden, who trains at the Empire United Fencing Club in New York City with former Olympian Jed Dupree as his coach, took up fencing at nine after a childhood fascination with swordplay. When a stranger saw the young Imboden playing with toy swords in a park, he suggested to his parents that he might enjoy the sport. By 16, Mr. Imboden had qualified for his first major international team, earning a bronze medal at the 2010 Cadet World Championships. Earlier this month, he was a member of the US Junior World Team that made history by winning gold for the third year in a row. In January at age 18, Mr. Imboden was one of the youngest competitors to medal in Senior World Cup competition, was named to his first senior US team, and rose to the sixth best in the world — all within a matter of months.

After graduating from Dwight ([www.dwight.edu](http://www.dwight.edu)), Mr. Imboden took a gap year to fence full-time. This fall, he will attend Notre Dame.
